'Game-Changing' New Treatment for Cancer Patients Available Soon in Canada

Trials are underway with the MR-Linac, a new hybrid radiation machine giving hope to cancer patients by offering treatment with unprecedented safety and efficiency. <u>CTV News Article here.</u>

In the last three years, David Hutson has beaten both throat and skin cancer.

Now he's hoping a new form of radiation treatment will help him overcome the prostate cancer he was diagnosed with last September. Hutson is the first patient in the world to experiment with a new cancer-killing technology called MR-Linac.

"I feel very lucky indeed that I'm having this treatment. I feel very confident in this technology," he says from the Christie Hospital Manchester in the United Kingdom.

"And from my diagnosis, it's going to help me to defeat this third bout of cancer." Normally, radiotherapy is carried out in two stages.

First, a scan of the tumour is made. Then a dose of radiation is delivered. Part MRI scanner and part radiation machine, the MR-Linac allows doctors to do both tasks at once; they can visualize the tumour in real time while beaming high-energy radiation to the area.

The result is on-the-spot imaging and targeted treatment in one shot. Because doctors can give more precise and intense doses of radiation, the groundbreaking technology could treat cancers with unprecedented safety and efficiency.

MR-Linac could also be an effective treatment for forms of cancer that move, or that are normally impossible to treat with radiation because of their proximity to vital organs, like the pancreas or liver.

Ananya Choudhury, a clinical oncology consultant at Christie Hospital Manchester, believes the new cancer-fighting technology has huge potential.

"If we can do that, then we can not only treat the patients with radiotherapy, but we can increase the dose to try and increase the cure rate," he says.

Toronto's <u>Princess Margaret Cancer Centre</u> and <u>Sunnybrook Hospital</u> currently house the only MR-Linac machines in Canada.

Sunnybrook is also a founding member of an international consortium of doctors and experts leading the charge in developing this state-of-the-art device.

Other members include medical centres in the United Kingdom, the United States and the Netherlands.

In March 2019, Health Canada approved a medical device license for the MR-Linac, a move that clears the machine to be sold commercially and used for research in Canada.

'We're Also Treating a Relationship': Sask. Doctor Applauds Government's Move to Cover Penile Implants

Saskatchewan urologist Dr. Francisco Garcia said it can be difficult for men to admit they're experiencing erectile dysfunction, but he's hopeful public conversations can ease the stigma.

He also thinks it might be easier to talk about now that the province is helping foot the bill for a procedure that can help men perform again.

"Not only is it OK to ask for help, but we have some solutions," Garcia said.


Under an order of council that came into effect earlier this month, Saskatchewan's government will now cover the penile implant procedure. That coverage was ended by the province in 1993.

"The psychological benefits, I think, are immense" for men who get the implants, said Garcia. "The idea of being able to be potent can be very important for a lot of guys, and almost defining."

Garcia said confidence is a key factor, especially for men who experience erectile dysfunction because of a cancer, trauma or deformity.

Once the procedure was insured, Garcia was able to bring men into his office to discuss options they previously couldn't access because of cost — some of whom were clearly happy about the news.

"I'm fairly sure at least one of those guys skipped in," he said, noting his administrative staff described the incident.

But Garcia notes the effects of the implants go beyond a man's psychological and physical well-being.

"We're also treating a relationship," he said, adding it allows partners to "re-engage in that nice, very intimate and personal way, in that physical way that they may not have been able to do for years."

Criteria for Coverage

Before the procedure was funded, Garcia said it would cost a patient about \$15,000 to \$16,000, including about \$7,500 to \$9,000 for the device on top of hospital fees.

The change came about after a physician submitted a request through the Saskatchewan Medical Association to have the penile prosthesis procedure insured by the Ministry of Health, according to a ministry spokesperson, and the two organizations began negotiations.

They agreed to insure penile prosthesis under specific conditions. The ministry estimates that given the criteria an estimated 12 to 15 patients per year will qualify for coverage.

For example, the procedure must be medically required and all other treatment options must be exhausted.

Furthermore, the cost of the prosthesis will be covered if the erectile dysfunction stems from surgical injury or trauma. This could include prostate, rectal, colon or bladder cancer survivors who experienced damage from surgery or radiation, Garcia said.

"It opens up the door for those who've had car accidents or other trauma where they've had permanent severing of the nerves."

It can also be covered if the need comes from severe penile deformity and Peyronie's disease — which "can cause twisting [into] all sorts of different shapes when the penis is erect," said Garcia.

"Basically it's a scar that will cause curvature."

He said men with this condition can have reconstruction surgery, but the surgery that straightens the penis often leaves the man unable to have normal erections. Now, Garcia said he'll be able to put in an implant at the same time they do reconstruction surgery.

There are some limitations. People who have lost function because of vascular disease or blood vessel problems are not covered, Garcia said, adding that could be put to the ministry in the future.

He noted the coverage change was a long time coming and credited another physician in Saskatoon and the SMA for pushing for the change.

"We were able to have our voices heard and get some patient stories there to understand the impact," he said.

"I think everybody kind of agreed that there definitely is a role for restoring this sexual function in men."

GOOD TO KNOW

What to Eat: Advice for Men with Prostate Cancer

Some prostate cancer experts recommend that men diagnosed with prostate cancer eat a plant-based diet. A lot of men might hear that and wonder if that means they need to become vegetarians or adopt a vegan diet. Do they? In reality, the recommendation is more nuanced than that, and whether a man wants to include animal sources of protein in his diet is more of a personal choice. If he does, healthier options, such as fish and skinless poultry, are recommended.

Although red meat is not a recommended choice, it's probably OK to have it on special occasions, as long as leaner cuts, such as top sirloin, are chosen. And avoid processed meats such as hot dogs and cold cuts, which the International Agency for Research on Cancer has identified as carcinogenic (substances that cause cancer) in humans. Avoid processed red meat, in particular.

Is it OK to fire up the grill?

Scientists have known for some time that cooking beef, pork, poultry, or fish at high temperatures, such as those involved in grilling over an open flame (as well as pan frying), produces substances called heterocyclic amines (HCAs) and polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), which have been linked to cancer. As a rule, lower-temperature cooking methods such as baking and roasting are preferable.

If you want to enjoy the thrill of the grill occasionally, remove any skin on the meat before eating it. That's because the cancer-causing toxins appear to be more concentrated in the skin, which is also a source of unhealthy saturated fat, so it's best to avoid it.
