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Surgical Performance and Wait Times

Saskatchewan's surgical system is making progress in ramping up volumes and providing surgeries to patients who need them most. In the fiscal year from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2023, surgical volume was the highest ever recorded in Saskatchewan for a one-year period. This trend has continued in the current fiscal year, as surgical volumes continue to rise, and wait lists fall.

Saskatchewan's online Specialist Directory is updated and improved to make it easy to find current surgical wait times and information about surgical specialists in Saskatchewan.

- how long patients usually wait to have surgery

You and your family doctor can use this information to see which surgeons have the shortest wait times and to choose the most appropriate surgeon for you. All appointments with a specialist require a referral from a doctor or a nurse practitioner.

Principles

- 6. Whenever peer sharing is over, it's over.
